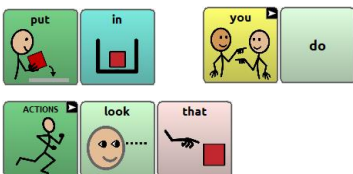

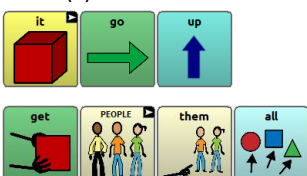

Tips to Engage, Expand, and Succeed:

- Bubbles are a simple and classic activity that keeps kids engaged and playing. But, if you are looking for more fun and creative ideas try searching Pinterest. There are some fun activities to be found, like painting with bubbles, making giant bubbles, designing bubble wands, making unbreakable bubbles, and creating bubble snakes.
- Remember to focus most of your modeling on core words. The words "blow" and "pop" are used a lot in activity like blowing bubbles. However, we don't use them many other times throughout the day. So, try to focus on other core words you can use while playing.
 - Ready to blow more bubbles? Have the child tell you: **go, more, or do it**
 - Ready to pop the bubbles? Use other core words like: **You do it, Get the bubbles, Get them all**
- Don't make this fun activity feel like work! Avoid requiring the child to work for the bubbles by having them ask/tell you to blow bubbles each time. You can do it a few times, but not every time! Keep your modeling of language natural to increase engagement and opportunities for communication.
