


According to typical language development, children start asking questions using question words (e.g., what, WHO, where) around 2-3 years of age. Asking questions is how we get information about the world around us.

- WHO is that?
- **WHO** is picking me up?
- WHO is here?
- WHO has my things?





FIND IT:

Find the word on the device. **WHO** is a question word so it will typically be a on the QUESTION page. If needed, use the Word Finder feature to learn where the word is located.






**DEFINE IT:** 

The word **WHO** is a question word. We use it to find out about people.



**USE IT:** 

Pay attention to when you already say the word throughout the day and touch the word **WHO** on the device whenever you say it. In addition to the ones above, here are a few more examples, "**WHO** is *verbing?* **WHO** likes candy? **WHO** wants a turn? **WHO** sees that? **WHO** wants to go? **WHO** 




Read a **book**: almost any "hide/seek" or flap book

Sing a **song**: "WHO stole the cookie"

**EXPERIENCE IT:** 

Have a question of the day: "WHO likes..."

Look through family **pictures**, and ask "WHO is that?"



**EXPECT IT:** 

**Attendance Caller:** Have him/her ask "WHO is here?"

Create opportunities to practice saying the word.

the host, "WHO is behind door #1."

**Book reader:** Have him/her read book to sibling or class

**Game Show Host:** Play a game in class. Let him/her be

"WHO is that?" or "WHO is verbing?"
