What is	
AAC	Augmentative and alternative communication
	 Methods of communication that we use to supplement or replace spoken or written language Can vary with language systems that include words, phrases, sentences, keyboards, or a combination of all of these Can range from writing, drawing, symbols, all the way up to a speech generating device with voice output
language	 Represents words, either spoken or written Using single words or combining them in a structured, rule-governed way These rules are primarily learned through exposure and practice over time Used to help us communicate more effectively
communication	 About the social interaction and the message it represents Is sending and receiving information It expresses thoughts and ideas It helps us learn new things Is helps us build relationships
